# A PROCLAMATION OF THE MAYOR'S OFFICE OF THE CITY OF OWOSSO, MICHIGAN RECOGNIZING THE DISTINGUISHED PUBLIC SERVICE OF CHARLES KINCAID, SR.

WHEREAS,	Charles Kincaid, Sr. began his career with the City of Owosso on March 3, 1999,
	and would famously become known as The Parking Enforcement Officer for the
	Owosso Police Department, walking anywhere between 10,000-15,000 steps in
	the decomposition of the decomposition of

the downtown area in a day; and

WHEREAS, though he may have been issuing tickets along the way, it was always with a friendly smile, wave or hello to residents and business owners, spreading goodwill

as he walked and chalked; and

WHEREAS, in addition to his employment with the City, Charles has always been highly involved in the community, constantly searching for opportunities to give back; and

WHEREAS, he has actively served in the Kiwanis organization for over 28 years in many capacities from member, to treasurer, to president three times over, and governor of the organization for the entire state of Michigan; and

WHEREAS, Charles is tireless, continuing his service to the community at the age of 87, not only thru Kiwanis, but also as a long-time election inspector; and

WHEREAS, Charles embodies community spirit, which earned him the title of Grand Marshall of the Curwood Festival Parade in 2021; and

WHEREAS, Charles is a proud member of Gracepointe Wesleyan Church since 1951, serving the congregation as an usher; and

WHEREAS, when friends are asked to describe him, it is with a unanimous smile and accolades

for his caring, kind, warm-hearted demeanor; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Office that Charles's Honorable and Distinguished Public

Service be recognized.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED that I, Robert J. Teich, Jr., Mayor of the City of Owosso, on behalf of the citizens of Owosso, hereby recognize and thank Charles Kincaid, Sr. for his 24 years of dedicated service to the City of Owosso and further express our sincere wishes to Charles and his family for a long, healthy and happy retirement.

Public Safety Director Kevin D. Lenkart stepped to the podium and regaled those present with stories detailing Charles's philosophy that no one is above the law when it comes to parking enforcement, going so far as to ticket the County Sheriff's patrol vehicle when it had occupied a space for too long.

Charles Kincaid, Sr. briefly commented, saying the City was the best place he ever worked and Chief Lenkart was one of the best bosses he'd ever had. He went on to say that he was handing the mantel of oldest Public Safety employee over to Chief Lenkart and the title of longest tenured Public Safety employee to Detective Sergeant Rusty Lamay.

#### **CITIZEN COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS**

Eddie Urban, 601 Glenwood Avenue, inquired if Charles Kincaid had always walked while on duty and he thanked him for all that he has done in support of the community.

Tom Manke, 2910 W. M-21, said he was with the Sheriff when he received the parking ticket mentioned in the story and that Charles would give anyone a ticket, it didn't matter who they were. He went on to allege that the City Manager is covering up the recent hydrogen sulfide (H<sub>2</sub>S) study conducted on the sewer collection system and WWTP, saying dangerous gas levels are present, citizens and employees are in danger, and Council wasn't even aware of the study.

Jeff Turner, 204 Oakwood Avenue, said he was told by a police officer that the City is no longer giving tickets for cars parked on the street overnight and asked why the practice was stopped. Public Safety Director Lenkart clarified that the City still gives tickets for overnight parking on the street and that Mr. Turner should call the non-emergency phone number to request enforcement when he sees the rule being violated.

City Manager Henne responded to Mr. Manke's accusations saying that  $H_2S$  has been an issue in the sewer collection system and WWTP since at least 2011 when the Owosso & Caledonia Townships Utility Authority commissioned a study to find the reason their sewer pipes were collapsing. The report pointed to  $H_2S$ , a highly corrosive gas, as the culprit and suggested slip lining the pipes as a cost effective means to protect them from the gas. Fast forward to 2022 when staff at the WWTP began noticing corrosion on some of the plant's newly installed equipment. The WWTP Board ordered a second  $H_2S$  study, the preliminary results of which are now being circulated. The WWTP Board must be given time to analyze the study and determine the best course of action, when that has taken place the final report will be presented to Council. In the meantime, employees at the plant have received noxious gas training and detectors have been installed in key locations at the plant. He also noted that the only time the  $H_2S$  level increases is during very dry, hot periods like late summer when flows in the collection system are low. Under those conditions the flows take longer to get to the WWTP and start to generate  $H_2S$  along the way.

Mayor Pro-Tem Osika expressed her support for and trust of the City Manager.

Mayor Teich addressed the audience regarding the hydrogen sulfide study saying he had read the report and the facts speak for themselves. There is an issue with  $H_2S$  that needs to be addressed, but according to the study the only location that requires immediate remediation is the screening room at the WWTP, which has been done. This is not an issue where residents near manholes could be affected, this is an issue about  $H_2S$  gas corroding brand new equipment at the WWTP. To stop the corrosion the source of the gas must be fixed, which means Corunna and the townships have to fix the problem so it does not continue to get passed along to the WWTP. He said the danger of the problem isn't to people, it's to the infrastructure, and he thinks the WWTP Board has a handle on it.

Mayor Teich opened the floor for anyone that had questions for the City's Utilities Director on the subject who was present at the meeting.

Tom Manke referred to a specific spot in the report, saying it indicates people are being poisoned by  $H_2S$  gas inside their homes, that if a person can smell the gas they are being affected. Utilities Director Suchanek noted that all test readings were taken from inside the mains during hot, dry weather conditions, not from the ambient air inside homes. He also noted that p-traps in the home should be full of water preventing sewer gases from getting into the home, any gas present would be vented into the outside air at the roof. The danger with  $H_2S$  gas lies in smaller, confined spaces, not the inside of a home. Lastly, he noted that there are multiple ways the  $H_2S$  problem can be remediated and he had directed the WWTP Board to have a solution for the problem ready by August  $1^{st}$ .

Mayor Teich encouraged anyone else with questions or concerns about the issue to contact the Utilities Director.
